NEWS FROM THE HOUSEHOLD PANTRY.....

2022....What a year!!!

Even in the midst of the continuous pandemic, our amazing congregation at Lowell FUMC remained committed and dedicated to the Household Pantry with their monetary donations, product donations, and prayers. The pantry remained open CURBSIDE every month. We served an average of 40 families each month, with June being our lowest month serving 30 and December being our highest month serving 60. We distributed a total of 473 packed bags in 2022. THANK YOU FOR HELPING US BE ABLE TO SERVE NEEDY FAMILIES IN THE TRI-CREEK AREA.

We were able to supply our families with laundry detergent, dish soap, household cleaner, paper towel, facial tissue, toilet tissue, bar soap, deodorant, toothpaste/toothbrush, and shampoo/conditioner in a PREPACKAGED bag each month. Feminine hygiene products and diapers were available upon request. Our total costs for the Household Pantry for 2022 were \$5,064.60. It costs about \$422 a month to keep our pantry going!!

We continued to work in partnership with the Lowell Family Dollar in 2022. Rachel, the store manager, made sure our monthly orders got filled correctly. PLEASE thank Rachel for everything she continues to do for us. We also added Dollar Tree in St. John to our partnership last year because Family Dollar can't always get everything we need. So also a big thank you to Gail, the store manager of the Dollar Tree!

The pantry was blessed with donations from Tri-Kappa, Indian Trail Grange, Rotary Club, Stracks (paper bags), Avery Dennison, Athletico, a special couple who donated 6 Aldi gift cards to 6 families in need, along with many monetary donations within and outside the church. How fortunate the Household Pantry is to be remembered by so many thoughtful people!!

We head into 2023 with a dedicated staff of compassionate servants whose hearts lie in serving those in our community who need assistance. We are humbled to be able to serve these families. We could not keep this pantry going without ALL OF YOU!!!

Martha's Coffee House Resumes

Martha's Coffee House was closed for the 2 recent holiday Sundays having one worship service at 9:30. As we return to our regular worship schedule of 8:00 and 10:30 services each Sunday, Martha's will also resume.

In order to keep this time of fellowship functioning Congregational Care is requesting assistance. We do not expect anyone to remain in the church library the entire 1 ½ hour Martha's is available (from 9-10:30). Nor do we expect one person to cover all aspects of Martha's alone.

"Many hands make light work", the saying goes, so we are hoping to make that our Martha's goal. Won't you please consider assisting with this time of fellowship for our church family and guests?

How can you be involved? Choose one or more of these ways:

Be the 'early bird'. If you attend the 8:00 service, this could simply mean arriving earlier than usual to set up the coffee makers and hot water pot and mix up a quart of lemonade. Everything needed is stored on the metal cart which is kept in the library closet. Expendable items are stored in the cabinet beneath the microwave. The coffee can be started at 8:00 when the service starts, or you can pop into the library during a hymn to push the "on" buttons by 8:30.

Provide the treats. We like to offer a simple treat or two that is homemade or purchased to our church family & guests. To keep costs down, we rely on donations. Covid and the variety of viruses currently circulating makes it necessary for us to continue to take simple health precautions. Hand sanitizer is readily available during Martha's and treats are either individually wrapped, or can be plated or set out individually on napkins to help prevent sharing our germs. Treat donations can be brought to the church on Friday or brought in Sunday morning by 8:45. Leftovers can be taken home.

Be the clean-up crew. The countertop and the serving table can be cleaned up any time after the 10:30 service begins. The set-up is kept simple so cleaning up is not terribly time-consuming. (We don't want anyone to be late to lunch at George's.) Labels on the metal cart and in the cabinet let you know where items belong.

We'd love to see a little 'team work' to keep Martha's available and not a burden to anyone. Two people working as partners is ideal. (One comes early, one stays late.) Please give it some consideration. What friend could you ask to partner with you?
