

Mark's Remarks...



A friend sent me the following story a few years ago. Reflect on it.

The carrot, the egg, and the coffee bean

A young woman went to her mother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up. She was tired of fighting and struggling. It seemed that, as one problem was solved, a new one arose. Her mother took her to the kitchen. She filled three pots with water and placed each on a high fire. Soon the pots came to a boil. In the first, she placed carrots, in the second she placed eggs, and in the last she placed ground coffee beans.

She let them sit and boil, without saying a word. In about twenty minutes, she turned off the burners. She fished the carrots out and placed them in a bowl. She pulled the eggs out and placed them in a bowl. Then she ladled the coffee out and placed it in a bowl. Turning to her daughter, she asked, "Tell me, what do you see?"

"Carrots, eggs, and coffee," the young woman replied. The mother brought her closer and asked her to feel the carrots. She did and noted that they were soft. She then asked her to take an egg and break it. After pulling off the shell, she observed the hard-boiled egg. Finally, she asked her to sip the coffee. The daughter smiled as she tasted its rich aroma. The daughter then asked, "What does it mean, mother?"

Her mother explained that each of these objects had faced the same adversity - boiling water - but each reacted differently. The carrot went in strong, hard and unrelenting. However, after being subjected to the boiling water, it softened and became weak. The egg had been fragile. Its thin outer shell had protected its liquid interior. But, after sitting through the boiling water, its inside became hardened! The ground coffee beans were unique, however. After they were in the boiling water, they had changed the water.

"Which are you?" the mother asked her daughter. "When adversity knocks on your door, how do you respond? Are you a carrot, an egg, or a coffee bean?"

Think of this: Which am I? Am I the carrot that seems strong but, with pain and adversity, do I wilt and become soft and lose my strength? Am I the egg that starts with a malleable heart, but changes with the heat? Did I have a fluid spirit but, after a death, a breakup, or a financial hardship, does my shell look the same, but on the inside am I bitter and tough with a stiff spirit and a hardened heart? Or am I like the coffee bean? The bean actually changes the hot water, the very circumstance that brings the pain. When the water gets hot, it releases the fragrance and flavor. If you are like the bean, when things are at their worst, you get better and change the situation around you. When the hours are the darkest and trials are their greatest, do you elevate to another level?

How do you handle adversity? Are you a carrot, an egg, or a coffee bean?

We hope you have enjoyed Pastor Mark's sermon series on Resolutions during the month of January. The first 3 weeks of February he will be preaching on requests made by members of the congregation. On February 5 we'll talk about depression. On February 12 we'll discuss biblical slavery. On February 19 we'll cover cynicism. After this we'll talk about Music and Singing through Lent.

Wednesday, February 22 is Ash Wednesday. We will have our Ash Wednesday Service in the sanctuary at 7 pm. The focus of the service is repentance and remembering our mortality. The service ends with burning the palms from the previous Palm Sunday and applying them to the forehead in the shape of a cross. This service is designed to prepare our hearts for the journey to Easter. It's hard to truly celebrate Jesus' Resurrection without journeying through Lent and preparing ourselves spiritually.

Also this Lenten season, there will be a **Soup Luncheon in the Fellowship Hall each Sunday following the** 10:30 service beginning February 26. A simple meal of soup and bread will be a way to fast, to remind us to clear away distractions and focus on Christ. Gathering together for a soup luncheon will allow us additional time for reflection and preparation leading to a great EASTER celebration. There is no charge for this simple lunch; your presence and fellowship with our church family is all that we ask.

Watch for additional Lenten plans including Holy Week and Easter celebrations in the March Tele Christian.



LYFT (Live Your Faith Today) is our Thursday evening worship service. We start at 5:30 pm with dinner and go right into worship at 6 pm. Worship includes music, a lav speaker or Pastor Mark speaking. prayer and ends with communion. LYFT is a casual worship service where we look forward each week to food, fellowship and fun! Finance Committee Shares Your Generosity

"Gratitude is the memory of the heart." We are so blessed to have faithful giving to many ministries and missions of our First Church. As our Finance Committee meticulously examined and carefully reviewed the final financial giving for 2022 we became comforted by the support we witnessed through our final 2022 financial reports. Our congregational pledgers completed their pledge commitment for 2022 at a final giving total of 101%! The figure is reflected in the giving towards the General Budget as well as the Capital Projects Fund. Those who did not pledge, but faithfully and generously gave, provided their gifts so that the final figures reflected a positive year end budget.

One caveat is important to note. We would have fallen into the red had it not been for the ERC (Employee Retention Credit). The ERC gave eligible employers payroll tax credits for wages and health insurance paid to retained employees during the Covid restrictions/shutdowns. We want to thank a member of our congregation who brought this program to our attention.

As we move into 2023 embrace this thought from nineteenth-century preacher Charles Spurgeon, "Carve your name on hearts and not on marble." Our ministries add value to others and your commitment supports those ministries.

The FRIENDS Sunday School Class will begin a new video study on February 19 called, "Don't Give the Enemy a Seat at Your Table," led by Louie Giglio. There are six sessions, but you are welcome to attend whenever you can. PRAYER BLANKET MINISTRY

Congregational Care

The Prayer Blanket Ministry provides blankets to those who are experiencing physical, emotional or spiritual needs. There are several opportunities for YOU to be a part of this ministry and your church needs your help!

Pray for this ministry, the blankets, and the recipient.

- Deliver a blanket to someone who needs to feel the loving arms of Jesus wrapped around them during their difficulty. The recipient does not have to be a member of our church family. The blankets that are ready for delivery are located in the library. There is a sign out sheet and easy to follow directions posted by the blankets.
- Knit, crochet or tie a fleece blanket. Once completed, place the prayer blanket in the red bin located in the Narthex outside the office door.

The Prayer Blanket Ministry is in desperate need of blankets. Do you know how to knit or crochet? Would vou consider making a lap blanket? Maybe vou don't knit or crochet -- would vou be able to tie a fleece blanket? For those who are interested in making a tie fleece blanket, but unsure how or what size, follow these instructions including supplies needed.

SUPPLIES NEEDED TO MAKE A LAP SIZE FLEECE TIE PRAYER BLANKET

1. NON-PILL FLEECE. You will need 2 pieces of fleece to make one blanket. Finished lap blanket will measure 36" x 60". Most fleece is 72" wide. If you purchase fleece that measures 72" x 60", cut it in half for 2 pieces and the finished lap blanket will measure 36" x 60". OR You could choose to purchase a fleece tie blanket kit.

2. FABRIC SCISSORS

3. TAPE MEASURE and/or RULER

DIRECTIONS TO MAKE A LAP SIZE FLEECE TIE PRAYER BLANKET

- 1. Lay the non-pill fleece out flat and using fabric scissors cut the fleece to 36"X 60" if purchased from a bolt of fleece. If using a kit, fleece will already be cut.
- 2. Lay out one piece of the fleece flat and place the second piece of fleece directly on top of the first with wrong sides together. Make sure both pieces of fleece are flat.
- 3. Using fabric scissors, cut strips around all 4 outside edges. Each strip will be 1" wide and 2 1/2" long. Cut both pieces of fleece at the same time. There will be a square cut out of each corner measuring 2 1/2" x 2 1/2". Use a ruler or tape measure when cutting strips that will be used to tie.
- 4. Leave both pieces of fleece together and do not separate the top and bottom. Begin at a corner and tie a double knot with the one inch wide strips that have been cut.
- 5. Once all the ties have been double knotted, your fleece blanket is complete!
