

## Mark's Remarks...



I found a devotional by David Wilkerson that I like. Enjoy reading about the Resurrection Power. David Wilkerson (1931-2011)

"That I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being conformed to his death, if, by any means, I may attain to the resurrection from the dead".

(Philippians 3:10-11, NKJV)

What I'm about to say may come as a surprise to you. It is that the resurrection of Jesus Christ is all about power. When I say this, I don't just mean the divine power that raised Jesus from the dead. Of course, that kind of power is absolutely miraculous, and it can only come from God himself.

Christ's resurrection speaks of an additional power, and this one also only comes from God. It is a power that causes us to live holy lives, to be free from sin's dominion, to overcome every habit and lust known to man, to walk in a righteousness that comes from God alone by faith. To obtain this power is to know Christ in the power of his resurrection.

The apostle Paul speaks of this kind of resurrection power. He had a profound inner longing to know Christ, and that hunger came from his own deep cry for holiness. He found the answer in "Jesus Christ our Lord, who was born of the seed of David according to the flesh, and declared to be the Son of God with power according to the Spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead. Through him we have received grace and apostleship for obedience to the faith among all nations for his name" (Romans 1:3-5).

Paul saw that Jesus had come to earth as a man with the power of heaven resting upon him, power to heal the sick, set captives free, raise the dead and give eternal life. Jesus' resurrection, accompanied by a divine proclamation that he truly was the Son of God, opened the pathway for all to new, abundant life in him.


#### Well done, church family!

We collected over 400 cans of fruit, exceeding our goal, during the Fruit of the Spirit sermon series this Lenten season! Thank you for your donations!

Three local food pantries received 8 bags of canned fruit totaling 84 cans delivered to each one. The three local food pantries include Lowell Church of Christ, Lowell Lutheran Church, and the United Methodist Church in Cedar Lake. In addition, our very own LYFT received 174 items to serve at meals including individual fruit cups & applesauce!

**LYFT** is our Thursday evening worship service. We start at 5:30 pm with dinner and go right into worship at 6 pm. Worship includes music, a lay speaker or Pastor Mark speaking, prayer and followed by communion. LYFT is a casual worship service where we look forward each week to food, fellowship and fun! Everyone is welcome! Bring a friend!

TODAY! LYFT gets transformed into Messy Church on the fourth Thursday of each month. Do you know what 'Messy Church' is? We really don't get dirty or messy, it is just another way to say that we are doing church a little differently than normal. We start out as usual with dinner. After dinner, Pastor Mark divides us into 4 groups. The size of the groups depends on how many people are at LYFT that night, but it is

usually around 6 per group. There is no communion or speaker on 'Messy Church' night. Try it you might like it!

The four stations that we have at 'Messy Church' are:

1. Dessert station 2. Craft or Mission station 3. Discussion station (with Pastor Mark) 4. Game station





Our April mission of the month is Africa University. Africa University began in 1984 with the call for the UM Church to build a university in Africa. At the 1988 General Conference work on Africa University was approved as a United Methodist institution in Old Mutare, Zimbabwe. The first students were enrolled in agriculture. New degrees have since been added as well as dormitories, libraries, and other buildings. Students from all over Africa come and receive a top -quality education. Most of them then return to their country of origin and help build the economy. Your donation will help many Africans receive a university education.

### From the Finance Committee

Members of our church community are the foundation of our church. Through their efforts of resourceful skills, talents, and financial support, we can share God's message and reach out to our community with various programs. A culture of gratefulness in our church has a powerful impact on members and new visitors.

Tithing is a tribute to God: Your weekly gifts have shown your faith and trust in His name. We, at the Lowell United Methodist Church, are honored you've chosen us as your home.

The Finance Committee would like to share that the repairs and upgrades to the Memorial Brick Garden were made possible through the Memorial Brick Sales, landscaping budget, and most of the cost covered by anonymous donors. New cordless microphones will soon be in place, made possible by the support of our church members.

Each month there is a designated "Mission of the Month" for which members are asked to consider above and beyond their tithing. So far this year these have been United Methodist missions or our own church missions. Following the required procedure, a form was submitted seeking approval for raising funds to help supplement our Good Samaritan Fund (a budget line item previously approved by the Ad. Council.) So, looking ahead, the "Mission of the Month" in May will be our Good Samaritan Fund through the Generosity Tree on May 5 and 12.

Anyone seeking to understand the church budget and its management may stop by the office and ask for the income/expenses statements as well as the Cash, Memorials, and Designated Accounts statements.

Lowell First United Methodist Church has student loans available through the Clara Pixley Trust. Clara Pixley, one of our own Lowell Methodists, set up a trust in her will back in the 1940's to loan money to students to go to college or any trade school.

#### **Bell Tower Clocks**

The Trustees are proud to announce that the bell tower clocks are now functioning for the community. Clock faces were installed on all four sides of the bell tower in 1929. For the last 25 years or so the clock movement was not working. We have had the old mechanical clock movement replaced with an electronic system with one master controller that will automatically reset to the correct time in the fall and spring and after power outages. We pray the clocks will serve the community for decades to come. We have been in our downtown location for 100 years and we take pride in maintaining our historic building.

The *Easter Eggstravaganza* was held on Saturday, March 16, and it was a lot of fun. We served a free lunch of hotdogs, chips, cookies, and lemonade to all present. There were approximately 50 guests, 30 children and 20 adults, in attendance.
