Have Car Will Travel ... Drivers Ready to Serve

A Congregational Care Ministry



Sometimes our health keeps us from being able to drive. For example, we are often not released to drive a car until several weeks after surgery, yet we need to get to physical therapy or to a follow-up doctor's appointment. Sometimes a health issue forces a person to give up driving altogether. Usually a family member or close friend can provide transportation, but they might not always be available. If you find you are in need of a ride to a doctor appointment or a medical treatment, there are members of your church family who are willing to help. The church office has a list of volunteers who may be available to provide transportation to a medical appointments or treatments that is within Lake County, IN.

Contact the church office, or stop in, for a copy of the list of drivers. Keep the list at your home. You are responsible for making the phone calls to arrange your own ride. Be sure to call several days (even weeks) in advance of the appointment. Do not wait to call the night before the appointment. The volunteer drivers are busy people, with full calendars, and are not always available. A ride is not guaranteed.

We really need more drivers for this ministry so we can meet as many ride requests as possible. If you have a car. have free time on weekdays, and feel you would like to be involved in this ministry, please let the office know or contact Bev Kussy (219-789-7715).

Praying Through Financial Stewardship

Consider this thought; when you pray about "too little" your mind is drawn to all places you have too little. The more you think about it the less you see in your life. The result is anxiety and grumbling nature. Conversely, if you pray about "not too much" your mind is drawn to think about places where you have an abundance and can live comfortably with less than you have. The result is both gratitude and an opportunity to use those resources for the Kingdom work. Gratitude and generosity are the fruits of a generous life.

We will soon be receiving information regarding our financial faithfulness and stewardship. In relationship to financial stewardship at church, we want to steward our assets, gifts, and finances.

In his book, <u>Budgeting For A Healthy Church</u>, Jamie Dunlop writes about the importance of financial faithfulness. One of the challenges he gives is to pray for financial faithfulness. In doing so he gives a list of ideas of what to pray for in this arena. We want to share some of them with you.

- Pray that we (as a faith family) would be overwhelmed by how much Christ has given to us.
- Pray that I would give cheerfully, not out of guilt or obligation.
- Pray that I would be wise in how much I (and my family) decide to give.
- Pray that I would give regularly, deliberately, and proportionately.
- Pray that we would gladly part with what our world values in order to take hold of what God values.
- Pray that our church would be wise in how it stewards our gifts.
- Pray that our congregation would be known for its generosity.
- Pray that our giving would show God to be good, delightful, and generous.
- Pray that God would bring to fruition the hopes we have for every area of our church budget.

As you pray and seek His guidance, remind yourself of the Lord's goodness in our lives. We hope that this serves as a great reminder and resource for talking about godly stewardship. Our Finance team will be regularly praying for these things for ourselves, our family, and for us as a faith family. Will you join us?





Mission of the Month

In September we are supporting another local mission. **Community Help Network** was started at the United Methodist Church in Crown Point, and is now located in the ARC building warehouse across from the Crown Point High School. We supported their Buddy Bag Program last year. That program addresses food insecurity within the student population of South Lake County, including our Tri Creek School Corp. students. While food insecure students receive free meals on school days, these bags provide weekend supplemental nutrition with breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks for two days. Another program of the **Community Help Network** is called Ladle of Love. That program provides a meal to folks on two Saturdays each month. They also have a Household Pantry program that is just like our Household Pantry.

Fall Bible Study Begins for WINGS

Wings class will begin its Fall Bible Study on Sunday, September 15 at 8:15 in Room 300. The title of the series is "When Your Way Isn't Working" by noted Christian author and pastor, Kyle Idleman.

If you are feeling discouraged, frustrated, and worn out, it's a good indication that something in your life is out of sync. There is a solution to this problem found in Scripture. In John 15:5, Jesus tells his followers, "I am the vine, you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can't do anything." Instead of going it alone in this life, we are to stay connected to him.

In this five week video Bible Study, Pastor Idleman reveals how we can do that by:

- * Seeking out greater rest, depth, and connection in our lives
- * Recognizing that what we can't do makes room for what God can do
- * Finding freedom from the pressures of performance and production
- * Stepping out of loneliness and isolation even when it feels scary
- * Getting rid of all the distractions that keep us disconnected from Christ.

In the end, Pastor Kyle reveals that the fruit of your life will have nothing to do with your accomplishments and everything to do with your connections. No matter what happens in this world, the greatest joy comes from staying close to the God who stays close to you! All are welcome to join us! The class is facilitated by Al Martin.

Women's Faith Journey
