Mark's Remarks...



As we quickly approach Labor Day, I'm reminded of the words Paul uses in Ephesians 6:5: "Slaves obey your earthly masters with respect and fear, and with sincerity of heart, just as you would obey Christ. Obey them not only to win their favor when their eye is upon you, but as slaves of Christ, doing the will of God from your hears. Serve whole-heartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not people, because you know that the Lord will reward each one for whatever good they do, whether they are slave or free."

Of course, we know that slavery in whatever guise is an evil to society. It was the reality of the Roman world, however. So, what can this passage teach us? We are not to work solely to gain recognition for our efforts. We are not to suddenly start working hard when we know the boss is looking our way and then go back to slacking off when their eye turns elsewhere. God wants us to work wholeheartedly. That means to do it with your whole being. You need to get rest, you need a healthy diet, you need sabbath time to rejuvenate, you need to communicate clearly what your needs are to accomplish your tasks and to ask questions for anything that isn't clear to you.

Too many people go through life putting in way less than their potential when it comes to work. The old joke is the ditch digger leaning on their shovel. You find the same thing in corporate boardrooms, political offices, restaurant workers... frankly, everywhere. Even among volunteers in churches there are the shovel 'leaners'.

A much better way of looking at our tasks is to picture that we are employed by Jesus and working for God. I believe that God calls us to the work that He wants us to do. Sometimes it is for a season, sometimes it is for a lifetime. Whatever you are doing – a career, a job, a chore around the house, a favor for a friend, or volunteering at church or anywhere – view it as working for God. His eye is always upon you, and He will reward you for a job well done. You can still have fun, still interact as appropriate with those around you. The difference is, instead of seeing how little you must do to complete the task, see how diligently you can give your all to the task. Take pride in your work. Have a happy Labor Day!

Events like Music in the Park remind us that ministry often happens in the most natural settings—over shared meals, through beautiful music, and in the simple act of opening our doors to welcome others. It's through gatherings like these that we continue to strengthen the bonds that make our community a truly special place to call home.





Buddy Bag Summer Program: A Season of Success and Service Outreach and Mission Teams

Our church's Buddy Bag satellite program wrapped up in August after an incredibly successful eight-week run. This special summer extension of the regular school-year Buddy Bag program invited children to visit our church every Wednesday to "shop" for a variety of nutritious foods, ensuring that no child in our area went hungry during the summer months.

Over the course of the program, we served approximately 38 different participants who came week after week to fill their bags with wholesome food options. This effort was made possible through the remarkable generosity of our congregation, who donated over 200 food items, and the dedication of 15 volunteers who gave their time each Wednesday to make the program run smoothly.

But beyond the numbers, what truly made this program special were the countless expressions of gratitude we received from the families we served which reminded us why this ministry matters so much. These families didn't just receive food—they experienced the love and care of our church family in action.

We are grateful for every congregation member who donated items, every volunteer who gave their time, and every family who allowed us to serve them. The Buddy Bag satellite program exemplifies what it means to love our neighbors in practical, meaningful ways, and we look forward to continuing this vital ministry in the future.

Our Trustees are always Busy!

Our Trustees are constantly working to maintain our building and rental property as well as the parsonage. Their recent tasks around our church building have included the placement of a bench on the west side of the outdoor playground, changing light bulbs in the sanctuary, addressing a leak in the church roof, and filling potholes on the east edge of the parking lot. Proceeds from their June rummage sale are earmarked for the capital projects fund as the 1962 church boiler in the church has an uncertain lifespan.

This summer, after pursuing many bids, the Trustees were able to get the lower level painted at a total cost (paint and labor) of \$7,070.61. (If you haven't seen it yet, venture downstairs to check out the fresh clean Fellowship Hall, kitchen and classrooms!) Bids for replacement of the basement flooring are on hold due to the unexpected need to replace a sanctuary air conditioner. The Trustees are planning a dinner fundraiser for Oct. to keep building up the capital projects fund for future expenses.
