#### Mark's Remarks...



Recently, I had the opportunity to hear our Bishop, Tracy Malone, speak. She is an excellent speaker and a dynamic, energy-filled Bishop. She spoke about the mission focus of the Conference: What are the priorities of the Conference? As I reflected on these priorities, I could see how they should also be our priorities here at First Church.

Number one is Discipleship. It is the Mission Statement of the Denomination and our own church. We exist to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We need to encourage people to come to faith and then help them to grow in their faith throughout their lives. This is not an easy assignment. What works for one person may not be the answer for another. We need several experiences that allow people to move forward with their faith. It can be helping others, classroom teaching, self-learning, volunteer work, quiet reflection, loud music praising, prayer; there are many ways that we advance in our faith. The church generally offers these opportunities, the difficult part is to make it a comprehensive program to touch the lives of all in the church. We will continue to work on this.

The second priority (these are not in a specific order of importance), is church revitalization and church development. For us it would mean ministry revitalization and development. I'll give you a specific example from our church. Every year we had done a five day Vacation Bible School program. A couple of years ago, we decided to cut Friday out of the schedule because the kids were tied up with sports commitments and were not attending much on Friday. Last year we made a bold leap and decided to move from an evening format of four days to a daytime format including lunch for three days. We had a larger attendance this year than we did in the past few years. We need to evaluate all of our ministries. Do they need updating? Do they need to be eliminated? Have they served their purpose? Ending a great ministry is not a failure. It's an opportunity to free up resources to develop new ministries.

The third priority is faith formation and leadership development. Faith formation is different than discipleship. Discipleship is growing in faith. Faith formation is molding a faith according to one's spiritual giftedness and passions. It's one thing to ask someone if they want to teach Sunday School. It's quite another thing to invest in someone's life, to see what God is blessing them with. It's much easier for another to see your gifts than it is for you to see them. Faith formation is to step by step train someone, encourage them, enable them and guide them into the ministry role God is calling them. Leadership development again is encouraging others to see their God given talents to take on leadership roles. All in the church should be doing this.

There are six more priorities. I'll tell you about them next year. Reflect on these three. What can you do to encourage someone, teach someone, build someone up so that they are a stronger Christian? It doesn't have to be a big job. A simple smile, hug, or encouraging word can propel a Christian to new heights.

In November we will focus our attention on the Gospel lessons in the lectionary.

The Story of Thanksgiving Pastor Mark

What was the first Thanksgiving like? According to the Encyclopedia Britannica this is how it happened.

Plymouth's Thanksgiving began with a few colonists going out "fowling," possibly for turkeys but more probably for the easier prey of geese and ducks, since they "in one day killed as much as...served the company almost a week." Next, 90 or so Wampanoag made a surprise appearance at the settlement's gate, doubtlessly unnerving the 50 or so colonists. Nevertheless, over the next few days the two groups socialized without incident. The Wampanoag contributed venison to the feast, which included the fowl and probably fish, eels, shellfish, stews, vegetables, and beer. Since Plymouth had few buildings and manufactured goods, most people ate outside while sitting on the ground or on barrels with plates on their laps. The men fired guns, ran races, and drank liquor, struggling to speak in broken English and Wampanoag. This was a rather disorderly affair.

I'm the church mouse. I see all that goes on in the church and I love to gossip about it. Of course being a Christian mouse, I only say positive things.


