More details and service information will be in the March Tele Christian.

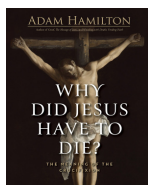

Book Study for Lent

Why did Jesus Have to Die?: The Meaning of the Crucifixion

For the six Sundays of Lent, beginning **February 22** and ending **March 29**, Pastor Mark's sermons will go along with the latest study written by Methodist pastor and best-selling author Adam Hamilton.

Here is an introduction to the study:

Why did Jesus Have to Die?: The Meaning of the Crucifixion

"Despite the crucifixion's central place in Christian faith, the New Testament offers few clear answers about how Jesus' death saves, or why, exactly, he had to die. The New Testament writers use a host of metaphors—ransom, sacrifice, reconciliation, victory—but never explain exactly how it works or why it had to happen this way. What if that's because we've been asking the wrong question? What if the cross isn't a transaction to be explained, but a living Word from God meant to transform who we are and how we live?"

In addition to Pastor Mark's sermons, the two Sunday morning adult discussion groups will be joining together for a six session journey viewing a weekly video and sharing discussion on The Meaning of the Crucifixion.

The participants of both the WINGS class and the F.R.I.E.N.D.S. class **invite and encourage** you to join them on the 3rd floor at 8:15AM each Sunday **for their combined class in the Wings room (300)** during Lent for this study. Let's deepen our understanding of the Crucifixion together as a church family!

10. Started a Tuesday worship service at Lowell Healthcare with average attendance of 20.
11. Purchased new linens for the altar rails to cover Communion elements.
12. Provided Mother's Day flowers and Father's Day cookies and candy.
13. Acolytes carried God's light in and out of the sanctuary during worship.
14. Coordinated the Chancel Choir, Bell Choir, Praise Team and special music.
15. Coordinated our organist and pianist to provide accompaniment at worship.
16. Provided training for ushers, greeters, liturgists and acolytes.
17. Decorated inside the church and out for Christmas and Easter.
18. Draped the cross inside and out for Lent and Easter.
19. Provided a song leader each Sunday.
20. Had special services at Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and two services on Christmas Eve.
21. Changed the time of the 11 pm Christmas Eve service to 4 pm.
22. Decorated the altar for Thanksgiving, Pentecost and other visuals for sermon topics.
23. Had special meals at LYFT for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Maundy Thursday.
24. Provided Global prayer concerns each week with a board posted in front.
25. Recognized individuals transferring membership and new member services.
26. On Palm Sunday had children carry palms in and congregation waved palms.
27. Helped with carol sing at Winterfest.
28. Planned Homecoming service, send out letters and buy gifts to give out.
29. Had nursery available as needed.
30. Had services live-streamed and posted to YouTube. Provide tech support for sound and computer for service.
31. Encouraged a cantata by our Chancel Choir.
32. Provided Tele-Christian articles monthly.
33. Provided bulletins weekly.
34. Had Communion monthly and provide it three different ways.
35. Used special instruments, horns, violins etc. to enhance music.

The worship committee meets every other month and would welcome new members.

Mission of the Month

In January we supported Kokomo Urban Outreach. In February we are supporting Kafakumba Training Center in Zambia, Africa. This mission was started by John Enright and Ken Vance. The mission has done some ground-breaking work that is being looked at across Africa. They have a pastor's school to train Africans to serve their people. They are doing agricultural work and teaching farmers techniques to increase yield in the area. They give farmers banana trees and guava plants with the expectation that the farmer will then give plants to other farmers. They are teaching women skills to earn money on their own. John and Ken began with a flight mission in Zaire, but felt called to do more. On February 8 there will be envelopes in the bulletins that we will accept all month to help this mission.

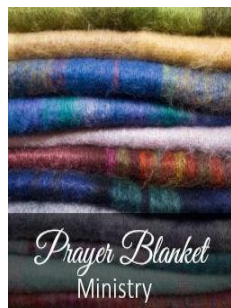
